One year of education post-high school opens up new opportunities and puts them on a career pathway




Self-sustaining employment is the key to long-term economic selfsufficiency and permanently breaking the cycle of homelessness and poverty

1,735 (+235) YOUTH WALKED THROUGH OUR DOORS LAST YEAR




YOUTH SERVICES

Larkin Street provides services for a client population of diverse backgrounds and origins



In our last fiscal year we served a client population of 86% Youth of Color



These young people face a number of obstacles to finding stable, independent housing




TAY (Transitional Age Youth) Navigation & Youth Access Points: provide referrals to emergency, transitional & permanent housing for youth 18-25 years old. Coordinated Entry housing search within Larkin Street programs and beyond.

Supportive Housing:

- Casa Adelante: a supportive housing program that provides 29 units of affordable apartments for transitional age youth and parenting youth.
- Edward II, Ellis Street Apartments, and Routz: long-term supportive housing with on-site case management; with a focus on young people with mental illness at Routz.

Transitional Housing:

- Castro Youth Housing Initiative (CYHI): A two-year scattered-site housing program for young people who identify as LGBTQ including our housing program for transgender youth.
- Assisted Care: Congregate site housing with onsite specialty services for young people who are HIV positive and HIV vulnerable.
- LEASE: Scattered-site housing for former foster youth.
- Geary House and 1020 Haight: Two-year dorm-style transitional housing programs.
- Turning Point* (formerly run by Fred Finch Youth & Family Services): Located in Berkeley, California, Turning Point is a temporary, transitional housing program designed to assist young people experiencing homelessness ages 18-25 to obtain and maintain independent permanent housing.
- Mission Inn: Supportive housing community for Transition Age Youth (TAY, ages 18-24) experiencing homelessness located in the Mission.
- Casa Esperanza: Supportive housing community for Transition Age Youth (TAY, ages 18–24) experiencing homelessness located in the Mission. For Spanish- or indigenous- language speakers, using or seeking legal services to adjust immigration status, systematically and historically marginalized TAY that have been disparately impacted by homelessness.



SB 1079 (Menjivar)

- Creates a dedicated funding source, the 2024 Youth Housing Bond Fund, to combat youth homelessness.
- Allows both public agencies and community-based organizations with specific youth expertise to apply for the youth bond funds.
- Supports housing for youth experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness and current and former foster youth.
